"Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed.Take up the cause of the fatherless; plead the case of the widow." - Isaiah 1:17

"Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." - Galatians 6:2

Our call to seek justice and our call to community are clear. But in practice, they often leave each other out. We are drawn into community practices that isolate us or fail to work against injustice, and we are pulled into justice movements that fail to deepen our relationships with others.

Pilgrimage Pain®Hope

A journey of visiting Durham's historical sites, hearing from elders, and reflecting on the Biblical story to discover how Durham's story, our stories, and God's story are woven together.

Erica Stark participated in the Durham Pilgrimage of Pain and Hope through the BRIDDDGE program at Duke Divinity School. Since then she has been a student leader, taking incoming students on the journey.

- I've now experienced the pilgrimage three times with three different groups, and it is incredible to see the transformation.
- **()** It really encourages conversation. The reflection is not just internal. When we open it up...and ask if anyone has anything to share, the authenticity and the vulnerability and the brave space that allows that to happen is just transformative for them. 💔
- One of the most powerful things about the BRIDDDGE program and the partnership with DurhamCares is the relationships that are built in experiencing this together. Some of my best friends now I met during the pilgrimage through BRIDDDGE, the BRIDDDGE and DurhamCares collaboration. And that's what Durham Cares is about: building community, everywhere. So it's just something that you don't expect, but it's a lifelong benefit that I will forever be grateful for. 💔

Genesis Journey

The Genesis Journey is a first step to the pilgrimage – a half-day spiritual journey where participants are introduced to the themes of the Durham Pilgrimage of Pain and Hope by encountering a place in Durham with a posture of listening and learning.

Kit Chappell is part of More Than Neighbors, a group of people from multiple churches seeking racial understanding and healing.

Our racial healing team called 'More than Neighbors' formed two years ago. We decided we wanted to learn more about the actual history of Durham and the racial issues surrounding Durham in the past....There are members on our team who did not grow up in Durham. There are some of us who grew up in Durham or the surrounding county, who were totally, like myself, unaware about a lot issues that faced the Black community years ago, and even today.

The Genesis Journey was very specific as to actual events that happened in Durham. And it was easy to walk through and understand. And it felt more alive when you actually walked the journey where these issues had taken place.... When I learned about the [Carolina Theater] protests, I was really shocked, because I attended movies at the Carolina Theater and never realized those protests were happening....When we actually walked the walk at the Carolina Theater that our Black friends had walked back then, we actually came up the steps on the outside, and, you know, we entered the way they would have entered, and went to the top balcony. And I felt like I was experiencing something, I mean, I was just shocked. I had been there in the theater probably at the same time that my neighbors were being treated that way. I was totally surprised that it was going on, and also it was very humbling. **(?**

LOCKED IN SULIDARITY

A week of prayer, awareness, and action around mass incarceration, in collaboration with other organizations in Durham.

- In each of our cities we have this racialized history that has created the layout of our cities. What DurhamCares does is it brings people on a journey to understand that so we can do something different.
- If you're anything like me, you can watch a documentary, read a book, watch a video online, get inspired, and learn about these things, but you're doing it apart from community. It's not an embodied experience. Locked in Solidarity, you're with other people, you realize that it's not you and your nonprofit or church, but it's you and people that you've never met before that are showing up and caring about this.
- Py DurhamCares putting on these events, it's allowing these misconceptions to be dissolved and for another story, a new narrative, to be surfaced.





The Freedom School is a six-week, multicultural summer enrichment program that supports K-8 scholars and their families through five essential components: high-quality academic and character-building enrichment, parent and family involvement, civic engagement and social action, intergenerational servant leadership development, and nutrition, health, and mental health.

DurhamCares serves as the Freedom School's fiscal sponsor and provides assistance with operations, publicity, and sustainability.

Journey_{TO} Thriving

Journey to Thriving is a program where congregations learn about their community, reflect on their congregational identity, and adapt to our changing world. This year we launched the first of three cohorts, welcoming six churches into the program.

([Journey to Thriving] is an opportunity for Epworth to take it to another level, to experience being with other churches in this journey of what it means to thrive - thrive as a community, thrive as a church, and then to understand the surroundings in which we live....Being with other churches, learning together, being in community together, helps us to understand what other churches are doing, it helps us to be able to maybe partner with other congregations in some of the work that's happening in our community, but it also allows us to engage in conversation. I think one of the biggest things that brought us to be part of this opportunity was the Pilgrimage of Pain and Hope. It is an opportunity for us, as a larger group, to be able to understand, what does Durham offer and what does the history of Durham contribute to who we are? What is this land we're on? And how did we get here? I always ask the question, 'what is your next faithful step? How are you moving towards living out your discipleship of loving God and loving your neighbor?' And so, we've been really concentrating on discipleship, what it means to love God and love your neighbor, and Journey

to Thriving will be part of that work for us, in helping our congregation continue to do the work of living into being the Church in the community. **(**




The Bull City Natiness relaunch brought together 12 teams, 43 players, 9 organizations, and 80 attendees!
